### FRAMEWORK AS AN EVALUATION TOOL

LEVEL 1: Increased Capacity	<ol> <li>What are the strengths and limitations in the capacity to influence policy change?</li> <li>How has capacity changed over time?</li> <li>What needs to be done to enhance capacity moving forward?</li> </ol>
LEVEL 2: Improved Conditions	<ol> <li>To what extent is progress being made on the interim outcomes required to influence policy?</li> <li>Where is the most progress being made and why? Where is the least progress being made and why?</li> <li>What needs to change in strategies, implementation, or capacity to make better progress?</li> </ol>
<b>LEVEL 3:</b> Policy Change	<ol> <li>At which stage in the process is the preferred policy?</li> <li>What was the relative contribution to the efforts to get the policy to this stage?</li> <li>What do we have to do to get the policy to the next stage?</li> </ol>
<b>LEVEL 4:</b> Behavior Change	<ol> <li>To what extent did the policy trigger changes in behaviors, actions, and practices in a system?</li> <li>To what extent do the changes contribute to the desired impact?</li> <li>How deep, durable and valuable are these changes?</li> <li>Were they any unintended consequences of the policy?</li> </ol>
<b>LEVEL 5:</b> Mission Level Impact	<ol> <li>To what extent did we see change in the impact of interest?</li> <li>To what extent did the policy contribute to changes in the outcomes and impact of interest? What was the influence of other contextual factors on the impact?</li> <li>Were there any unintended consequences of the policy?</li> <li>What was the economic impact of the policy (e.g., cost-effectiveness or benefit)?</li> </ol>

Policymaker Ratings Rate (1) policymaker level of support; (2) policymaker level of influence; (3) rater lever of confidence




#### Intense Period Debriefs
