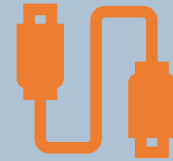

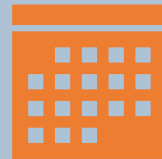

EVALUATIVE THINKING



Evaluation is an activity.
Evaluative thinking is a way of
doing business. – M Quinn Patton

WHAT?

- Critical, systems thinking
- Motivated by an attitude of inquisitiveness and belief in the value of evidence
- Involves identifying assumptions, and pursuing deeper understanding
- Informs decisions and actions

Buckely et al. 2015





WHY?

- Address evaluation anxiety
- Develop logic models, theories of change, program planning
- Design evaluations
- Gather data
- Reflective discussions

How?



If we ask this:	We might get that:
How does our organization know X?	More feedback (all directions)
How might we be wrong about X?	Reflective conversations among staff, beneficiaries, leadership, etc.
How does X connect to our intended outcomes?	More effective programs
Partner X's perspective on this might be Y!	Greater local level influence over project decisions



CREATING OPPORTUNITIES FOR EVALUATIVE THINKING

Existing structures and places to incorporate evaluative thinking:

Staff meetings

Board or professional meetings

Advisory committee / advisory group meetings

Grantee and partner meetings

Communities of practice

Steering committee meetings

Annual staff or team retreats

Site visits

DATA PLACEMATS

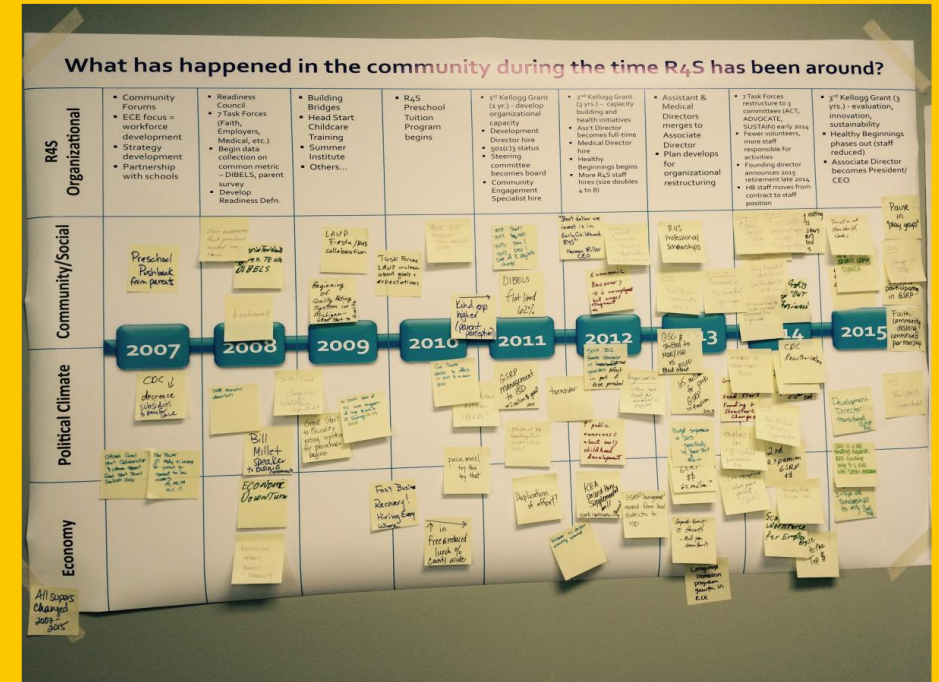
Reflective Questions:

- What do these data tell you?
- What surprises you about these data?
- What factors may explain some of the trends we are seeing?
- Do these findings lead to any new questions?
- What are you learning from this activity (key insights)?



TIMELINE MAPPING

- Map events, achievements, etc.
- Insight into their relationships to each other and to key contextual factors
- Institutional knowledge



EVALUATOR'S PERSPECTIVE ON EVALUATIVE THINKING

- A way to think deeper about your work
- Purpose is to encourage discussion and transparency, not criticize
- Safe space
- Role model
- Fun and engaging
